

We are focused on creating knowledge and ideas that help us to understand our world and make it a better place. Our research informs national policy, enriches culture and changes lives.



Influencing Debate and Policy

The research our staff produce shapes national debate around issues including women's rights, social justice and constitutional law.

Recently, Dr Katie Boyle (above right), in the Law School, led the nationally-funded 'UK in Changing Europe Initiative', which brought together leading constitutional lawyers, NGOs and think-tanks to explore the impact of Brexit on human rights. Her research has also informed the approach of the Scottish Human Rights Commission.

Dr Andrew Rogers, Principal Lecturer in Practical Theology in the Department of Humanities, is co-lead of the Faith and Place Network, which was launched at the House of Commons.

The network helps provide guidance for planners on how faith groups use space. Additionally they provide assistance for faith groups on how to engage with the planning system.



Empowering Women Through Teaching, Research and Engagement

Across the University, our research has a strong focus on enhancing the lives of women, both nationally and globally. Research includes informing education practice, addressing challenges for women in the workplace, improving women's health and wellbeing, improving access to human rights, and enhancing women's recognition in society and culture.

Improving Lives

The Learning & Teaching Office is working on a £250,000 project, in partnership with other universities, to measure achievement of Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) students in higher education. The project, which has received funding from national government, complements the significant body of work undertaken by the University and Roehampton Students' Union to support BAME student achievement.

In the Department of Life Sciences, Professor of Human-Animal Studies, Garry Marvin and his PhD student Melanie Ramaswamy, are working to enhance the lives of women and benefit local economies in Ethiopia through chicken rearing. The project, 'Going Places', began in 2017 and is funded by a £250,000 Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC) award and works directly with women in rural and semi-urban areas.



Supporting Young People

Professor Mick Cooper (above) from the Department of Psychology is undertaking a £850,000 nationwide research project into the benefits of professional school counsellors. A professional counselling service is being offered in 18 secondary schools to test whether pupils in need of support improve after counselling from a professional, compared to pupils who use schools' existing support services.



Scientific Discoveries

Dr Lewis Halsey, Dr Louise Soanes and Dr Jonathan Skinner from the Department of Life Sciences are undertaking an EU-funded project to protect sea turtles at risk of extinction.

The project, featured on BBC Two's *An Island Parish*, works with Anguilla National Trust (ANT) and Anguilla's Department of Fisheries and Marine Resource. They are monitoring nesting populations, identifying the impact of illegal hunting, and working with local organisations and policymakers to protect the species.

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

Research and course information

Research centres

Research in the Business School is organised into four clusters; Accounting; Economics and Finance; Marketing, Retailing and Supply Chain Management; and People, Organisations and Strategy. Research is diverse, and includes entrepreneurship, integrated thinking and financial reporting, collaborative work spaces and e-loyalty. The research is supported by the Business School research seminar series as well as research seminars organised by each of the clusters where visiting scholars are invited to present their latest research.

Recent research projects

As part of the Economic and Social Research Council funded project, Challenging Gendered Media Mis(s) Representations of Women Professionals and Leaders, Professor Carole Elliott has undertaken research into the underrepresentation of women in senior roles, particularly during the global financial crisis.

Professor of Economics, Stephen Drinkwater, was part of a team that conducted research into the effect disability has on employment. The analysis indicated that the likelihood of being in work falls by 21% in the first two years following a work-limiting disability, with weekly hours of work falling by a total of 23%.

Professor Elaine Harris is currently leading a project on the connection between advanced performance measurement systems and information for strategic investment project appraisal, funded by the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales (ICAEW) charitable trust.

Professor of Branding, Lia Zarantonello, is working on a project funded by the Marketing Science Institute (USA) on Consumer Happiness and its role in Customer Experience Management which examines the factors that determine consumer happiness and the influence of individual moderators and type of purchase.

Research and course information

Research centres

The internationally recognised Centre for Dance Research promotes research into dance as cultural and artistic expression, within and beyond theatre performance.

It aims to develop methodologies, practices and theoretical perspectives that help shape the future of international dance research.

Research ranges across historical, analytical, anthropological, philosophical, sociological and cultural studies of dance, and practice.

Recent research projects

Professor Stephanie Jordan's book *Mark Morris, Musician-Choreographer* is the first detailed study of the American choreographer's use of music.

Choreographer Dr Efrosini Protopapa was commissioned by Siobhan Davies Dance to contribute to *material / rearranged / to / be*, a performance installation presented in London and Glasgow.

Professor Emilyn Claid's commissioned film, *A Long Side*, is a choreographic portrayal of lifelong friendships and community, performed by older people from a former mining town in Northumberland.

Dr Sara Houston continues her research partnership with the English National Ballet, investigating the benefits of dancing for people with Parkinson's disease.

In her study of the Athens Festival, 1956-1966, Dr Stacey Prickett is investigating how the American, British, and Soviet governments used their elite ballet companies as instruments of 'soft power' during the Cold War.

Fulbright scholarship opportunity

The Fulbright Commission offers the Fulbright-University of Roehampton Award in Dance for US graduate students pursuing a one-year master's programme in Dance, or as the first year of a two-year master's degree.

Research and course information

Research centres

The Department houses the Centre for Performance and Creative Exchange (CPCE) and an interdisciplinary Research Group in Renaissance and Classical Studies.

The CPCE hosts regular events, seminar, symposia and performances, as well as practical workshops and artists' residencies, exploring key questions about histories, theories, and practices of performance and theatre.

Recent research projects

The European Union-funded 'Curating the Ephemeral' project, led by Professor Adrian Heathfield, explores curatorial practices in relation to immaterial art, both inside and outside visual art institutions. Professor Heathfield curated Taiwan's Pavilion at the 57th Venice Biennale, one of the most prestigious exhibitions of contemporary art globally.

The Leverhulme Trust-funded 'Acts of Assembly' project, led by Simon Bayly, Reader in Drama, Theatre and Performance, examines the pervasive phenomenon of face-to-face meetings in contemporary public life that is saturated with virtual forms of communication. Combining approaches from performance studies, anthropology, sociology, management studies and psychoanalysis, it seeks to understand the relationship between meetings as a social form and current experiences of collective belonging.

Sarah Gorman is conducting a critical analysis of what has been described by Geraldine Harris as the '4th wave' of contemporary experimental Western feminist performance. This project will conduct a long overdue survey of recent avant-garde artists who are proudly asserting their feminist credentials after what Elaine Aston has defined as a more tentative but 'media-friendly' version of feminist theatre in the 1990s.

Ewan Forster and Christopher Heighes, both Creative Research Fellows at the University of Roehampton presented their latest project, Three King's, at Arts & Humanities Festival 2016. Three King's is a consolidation of three recent projects by Forster and Heighes which have all revolved around the buildings of King's College.

Recent research projects

Professor Adam Ockelford runs Sounds of Intent, a UK-wide programme that aims to support musical development in the early years of children with learning difficulties. Co-founded with the Royal National Institute of the Blind, it delivers training and support to children's centres, nursery and early years staff, parents, carers and music practitioners.

Angela Colvert has helped thousands of children to learn how to read through the popular BAFTA-nominated game, Teach Your Monster To Read. The third game in the series has had hundreds of thousands of downloads, and teacher resources supporting the use of the game are distributed internationally.

Peter Kemp, Dr Billy Wong and Miles Berry have conducted research to analyse the uptake of computing qualifications at GCSE and A Level. The report urges an increase in the number of schools and colleges offering GCSE and A Level computing following results that show only a small fraction of pupils choose – or have the option to choose – to take qualifications at GCSE (5.5%) or A Level (1.7%).

National Award for SEN Coordinators

The postgraduate certificate meets the learning outcomes agreed nationally by the DfE and the SENCO Award providers' group for the NASENCO qualification. The course content is informed by current SEN and disability legislation, and underpinned by current theory and research related to Special and Inclusive Education.

In September 2009 it became statutory for every new Special Educational Needs Coordinator (SENCO) in a mainstream school to gain the master's-level National Award for Special Educational Needs Coordination within three years of taking up the post.

Research and course information

Research centres

The Department of English and Creative Writing is home to multiple research centres of international significance, including the National Centre for Research in Children's Literature (NCRCL), The Roehampton Poetry Centre, Centre for Research in Romanticism, and several specialised research groups such as The Memory, Reading and Writing Group and The Literature and Science Research Group.

Recent research projects

Before Shakespeare: The Beginnings of London Commercial Theatre is an Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC)-funded project that is investigating the significance of Tudor and Elizabethan dramatists, other than Shakespeare. The project includes performances and archival research to explore the world of sixteenth-century playhouses and the plays performed in them.

Memories of Fiction is an AHRC-funded project that seeks to find out how reading shapes our lives. The research has highlighted the importance of libraries to local communities as social resources.

Prison Reading Groups (PRG) promotes the spread of reading groups in prisons and provides funding and support for those who run them. The project now works with 37 groups across a variety of prison settings.

Professor David Harsent recently composed "The Judas Passion" with Scottish composer Sally Beamish, a contemporary piece that revisits the life of Judas Iscariot. The work was performed in San Francisco by the Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra.

Professor Zachary Leader has produced a high profile biography of Saul Bellow, one of the greatest 20th century American writers. The *Life of Saul Bellow* was published to mark 100 years since Bellow was born and was the first biography produced since the author's death, and the first to discuss his life and work in its entirety. It was named 'Literature Book of the Year' by the Sunday Times.

Research centres

The Department of Humanities is home to both the Centre for Hearth Tax Research, which holds primary sources such as records, parish maps and databases relating to the 17th century Hearth Tax. The Department also houses Digby Stuart Research Centre for Religion, Society and Human Flourishing, which promotes scholarly collaboration in the study of the Catholic tradition and its influences and contexts as well as fostering community dialogue.

In addition to the research centres, the Department also boasts three research groups that explore Renaissance and Classical Studies (with a focus on cultural reception); Sex, Gender and Sexuality (with contemporary interdisciplinary interests); and Ministerial Theology (all aspects of Christian Ministry).

Recent research projects

Dr Susan Deacy is part of an international team of scholars awarded €1.5 million funding to explore the role of classics in children's and young adults' contemporary culture. Dr Deacy, who won a National Teaching Fellowship for her work in finding sensitive ways to teach difficult subject matters, is developing teaching resources for children who are diagnosed on the autism spectrum.

Dr Andrew Rogers launched the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC)-funded Faith and Place Network with a policy briefing at the House of Commons. The network exists to address critical issues surrounding faith, especially for minority faith groups in the UK. It has brought together, for the first time, many groups with a strong interest in these issues, namely faith group representatives, planners, policy makers, local and national government representatives and civil society.

Dr Clare Watkins is undertaking research into marriage preparation courses in collaboration with the Catholic charity, Marriage Care. The research project carried out by Dr Watkins will investigate couples' and practitioners' experience of marriage preparation courses provided by Marriage Care.

Research and course information

Research centres

The Department of Life Sciences is home to various research centres that support and promote research across a range of disciplines. The centres include The Centre for Research in Evolutionary, Social and Interdisciplinary Anthropology (CRESIDA), The Centre for Research in Ecology (CRE), The Sport and Exercise Science Research Centre (SESRC), and The Health Sciences Research Centre (HSRC).

Recent research projects

Dr James Davies (CRESIDA) has identified that a quarter of a million people in the UK have been using Benzodiazepines for at least twelve times longer than the recommended period of two to four weeks.

Professor Anne Robertson and Dr Julia Reiss (CRE) have obtained Natural Environment Research Council (NERC) funding for a project exploring the relationship of freshwater community size structure with nutrient richness, and hence water quality, within and between biogeographic regions.

Professor Jolanta Opacka-Juffry's (HSRC) research into novel psychoactive substances (NPS), formerly known as 'legal highs' attracted widespread media commentary and has contributed to changes in UK policy on NPS (Psychoactive Substances Act 2016).

Dr Yolanda Calle-Patino (HSRC) is a Principal Investigator in a Cancer Research UK grant to study Acute Myeloid Leukaemia in collaboration with researchers at King's College London and Roehampton.

Dr Robert Busch (HSRC) has received funding from the Multiple Sclerosis (MS) Society for a two-year project identifying how vitamin D protects against the disease.

Dr Sandra Klaperski, Dr Adam Bruton, Dr Luke Felton and Linda Cronin (SESRC) have been awarded a South London Innovation and Diffusion Awards (2016) for Project GROW, establishing and testing a new intergenerational falls prevention gardening programme to improve physical activity levels, health and wellbeing in older people at risk of falling.

Research centres

The Centre for Research in English Language and Linguistics (CRELL) focuses on research in linguistics in the widest sense. Members' interests range from discourse analysis and sociolinguistics, to theoretical phonology and syntax.

The Centre for Research in Film and Audiovisual Cultures (CRFAC) aims to advance critical, historical and practical research relating to film and other media. It supports research on cinema, television, video/DVD, interactive platforms, online media, popular culture, journalism, and the politics of class and gender.

The Centre for Research in Translation and Transcultural Studies (CRTTS) promotes interdisciplinary research methodologically informed by theories in translation studies, cultural studies and postcolonial studies. The centre is the home of The Journal of Specialised Translation.

The Hispanic Research Centre (HRC) incorporates scholars working with, and across, a wide variety of Hispanic texts, including film and television, dictionaries, translation, oral history and autobiography.

Recent research projects

Dr Sabela Melchor-Couto is working with a European team on a €450,000 European Commission-funded project to support and expand the use of technology in language teaching across Europe. Building upon Roehampton's expertise in interactive language learning and education, Dr Melchor-Couto is conducting research into the positive effects that telecollaboration can have for teachers and pupils, as they use the technology more in their classrooms.

Research centres

The Department of Psychology supports research in a diverse range of disciplines including cognitive neuroscience and experimental psychology, abnormal and developmental psychopathology, and novel and applied research in Psychotherapy, Therapeutic Practice and the Arts therapies. The Department also hosts specialisms in health psychology and individual difference.

Research is organised around the core specialisms into the following centres:

- Cognition, Neuroscience and Neuroimaging
- Research into Counselling Psychotherapy practice and methods
- Applied research in child and adolescent well being
- Research into the Arts and Play Therapies

Recent research projects

Professor Mick Cooper is leading the £850,000 ETHOS research study, funded by the Economics and Social Research Council (ESRC), to evaluate the effectiveness, and cost-effectiveness, of school-based counselling. Integral to this work is an on-site Therapy and Research Clinic which provides a dedicated consulting suite for the development of studies on new interventions, methods and measures.

Dr Leigh Gibson is leading a £310,000 study funded by MRC entitled 'Improving healthy energy balance' which aims to improve obesity related behaviours amongst young children in Malaysia.

Professor Cecilia Essau undertakes research aimed at improving the understanding of child and adolescent psychopathology (anxiety, depression and conduct disorders) and is actively involved in the development of interventions, with international partners, to enhance young people's resilience.

MSc Attachment Studies

Research centres

Our active team of researchers publish in diverse areas including human rights, globalisation, conflict and war, parenting and families, sexualities, migration and refugees, urban criminology, prisons and policing, gender violence, international human rights law, drugs and illegal economies.

The Department holds regular research seminars and events, with internationally renowned speakers from both within and outside the University. Over half our research is 'world-leading' or 'internationally excellent' (Research Excellence Framework 2014).

The internationally recognised Crucible Centre for Human Rights Research is home to experts conducting research, training and teaching in the field of human rights, social justice and international relations.

Recent research projects

Katie Boyle completed an ESRC-funded project 'Human Rights in Transition' which assessed the challenges facing human rights protection in the UK.

Professor Aisha Gill's research has significantly contributed to new laws that have, and will continue to save women's lives in the UK. Her research into 'honour-killings', forced marriage and gender violence in British Asian communities has directly informed the development of life-saving legislation. Her research has been recognised with a prize for Outstanding Impact in Public Policy by the ESRC in 2015, and she has previously been awarded 'Professional of the Year' at the Asian Women of Achievement Awards.

Dr Caroline Oliver is lead researcher on a project funded by the EU Urban Innovative Actions programme, which evaluates an inclusive approach to the integration of asylum seekers in Utrecht.

Getting Here

The University of Roehampton is in zone three of the London transport system, just 30 minutes from central London.

National Rail

From Barnes station, the main campus (Digby Stuart, Froebel and Southlands Colleges) is a 10-minute walk and Whitelands College is a 25-minute walk, or a short ride on the 72 or 265 buses. Trains go to Barnes from Clapham Junction and Waterloo in one direction and Kingston, Richmond, Staines and Windsor in the other direction.

Underground

From Hammersmith (District/Piccadilly/Hammersmith and City/Circle lines), take the 72 bus from stop K in the lower bus station next to the shopping centre (above the Underground station). From Putney Bridge (District Line), take the 265 bus outside the station.

Bus

The University is well served by buses that link Roehampton to Hammersmith, Richmond, Kingston, Putney, Clapham Junction, Wimbledon and New Malden. The 72, 265 and 493 buses stop next to the main site and close to Whitelands and Mount Clare (at the junction of Danebury Avenue).

The 170 and 430 buses stop on Danebury Avenue, which is very close to Whitelands and Mount Clare and a short walk from the main site.

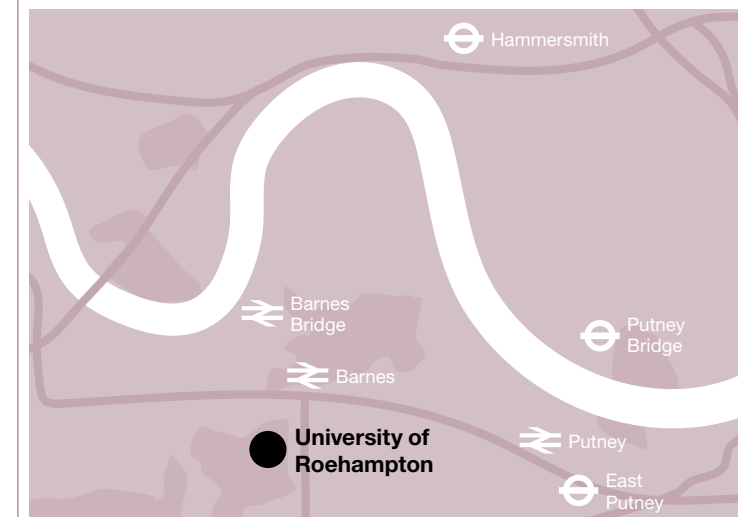
